



GENERAL WEDDING INFORMATION

The Three Stallion Inn's spectacular setting situated on the Green Mountain Stock Farm's 1,300 acres offers everything needed for an unforgettable celebration. There are a variety of recreational facilities and amenities both on-site and nearby. The historic estate has been updated in a casual, elegant style, perfect for making you and your guests feel right at home. Enclosed, please find information that will answer some of the most commonly asked questions about planning a wedding with us at the Three Stallion Inn.

Ceremony & Reception Arrangements

Wedding Ceremonies may take place here at the Three Stallion Inn. The inn and grounds provide a beautiful location whether at the trout pond, under the trees by the horse paddock or by any of our perennial gardens. There are also other possible sites in the area for your consideration such as a covered bridge or an historical church open only in the summer time. A variety of denominational churches are in Randolph, or you may choose the services of a Justice of the Peace.

Room Requirements

To ensure privacy for this special weekend, we do require a booking of all seven rooms in the Main Inn with a deposit of \$700.00. You may also choose to reserve the seven additional rooms in the Morgan House. A two night minimum stay is required for any room booked on the weekend (Friday and Saturday).

In the event you need additional lodging we will provide you with a list of local lodging facilities.

Bar Arrangements

All liquor and beverages will be handled through the Inn. We are a fully licensed establishment with liquor liability insurance. Vermont liquor laws dictate that outside alcoholic beverages are not permitted in the designated licensed areas. All service areas of the Inn and restaurant are licensed. For budgeting purposes \$20.00-\$27.00 per person is an average for beer, wine and champagne. For a full bar, including hard liquors, average prices are \$23.00 - \$33.00 per person. The final bill will depend on the type of beer, wine and liquor you choose. Many arrangements can be made to keep this cost within your budget.

***Should your event require a tent or additional equipment, we will refer you to a local rental company. Their representative will then discuss your options, contract and charge you accordingly based on your rental needs.*

The facility fee guarantees the use of the party area till 11 o'clock pm. If you would like to continue using the space after this appointed time there is a charge for each Bartender, Manager and miscellaneous Staff Member that is required.

In addition, should the deck require heat due to the unpredictability of Vermont weather, and to insure the comfort of your guests, there will be a charge of \$35 per hour added to your bill. Please be assured that you will only be charged for the hours that the heat is in use.

There is also the option to have a private bar for either your rehearsal or reception. If this is an option you are considering please note that there is an additional charge of \$25.00 per hour.

Deposits

We do require a \$1,500 deposit at the time of booking which will be applied to your final bill. After the initial deposit, one half of the contracted amount is due 90 days prior to the scheduled date of the event, then 30 days prior to the scheduled date of the event one half of the contracted net amount is due again. Finally 7 days prior to the scheduled date of the event the final payment is due, excluding bar charges that are billed per consumption.*

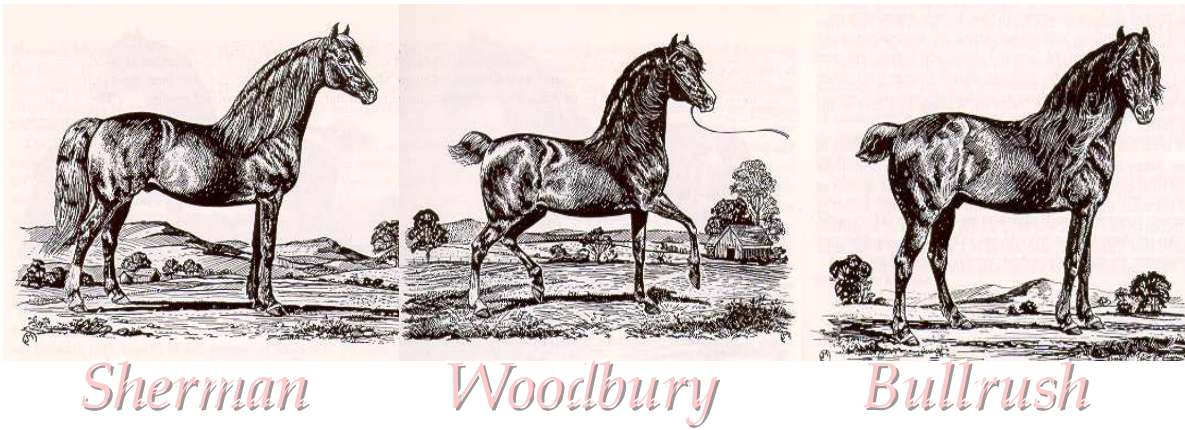
The Three Stallion Inn prefers a check for this and subsequent deposits. The deposit is refundable less \$1,000 with a 90-day advance notice providing the date is rebooked with a comparable party.

A 9% Vermont meal, 10% alcohol tax, and 20% gratuity will be added to all functions.

Justin Morgan, born in 1747 in West Springfield, Massachusetts, was a landowner and farmer who maintained a stable and stood stallions. In 1788 he decided to move his growing family to Randolph, Vermont. In 1795, Justin brought the two-year-old colt "Figure" to Randolph from West Springfield. Tradition says it was in lieu of money owed to him. Figure was a very popular breeding stallion for over twenty-five years and must have had over a hundred sons and daughters. Only three sons, whom resembled their father in form, temperament and hardiness, are known to have left get and are the ancestors of all modern Morgans: Sherman, Bullrush and Woodbury. They lived long and useful lives; their soundness and endurance under harsh conditions of frontier life impressed the practical horsemen of the time. Their beauty and grace added to their renown. Many mares were brought to these stallions in hopes their offspring would resemble the sires, their owners were not disappointed. The isolation of these Eastern Vermont and Connecticut River towns allowed the inbreeding of several generations of these Morgan horses. With comparatively little outside blood, a sufficient gene pool was created establishing a new breed by mid-century. There were no better stallions around for any purpose.
